5.2 <u>City Collision Trends Review (Matthew Sweet, Manager, Active Transportation 10</u> <u>minutes)</u>

Matthew Sweet, Manager, Active Transportation advised that the memorandum included cycling collisions that occurred at roadways/intersections owned and operated by the City of Mississauga and did not included cycling collisions that occurred at roadways/intersections owned and operated by the Region of Peel. Mr. Sweet further spoke to the data limitations in the collision analysis and noted that collisions that were still under investigation were not accessible for review and were not included in the analysis. Amy Parker, Active Transportation Technologist provided a presentation on cycling collisions in the City and spoke to the collision analysis, collision history, collision trends and recommendations. Mr. Sweet and Ms. Parker responded to questions.

Councillor Fonseca requested that the Peel Regional Police attend the April meeting to discuss City and Regional Road collision trends.

Background

working

Public We

In September 2018, Regional Council approved the implementation of Vision Zero Road Safety Strategic Plan to reduce and ultimately eliminate fatal and injury motor vehicle collisions in Peel. This plan envisions 'zero fatal and injury collisions for all road users' with a goal of '10 per cent reduction in fatal and injury collisions by 2022'. Six emphasis areas were identified as priorities for safety improvement including intersections, aggressive driving, distracted driving, impaired driving, pedestrians and cyclists. It is based on shared responsibilities where all the stakeholders have a part to play to make the plan a success.




Figure 1: Region of Peel Roadways Map

This memo summarizes the historical reported collision data (2014 – 2020) on Regional roads in the City of Mississauga. Collisions that occurred on roads under the jurisdiction of the City of Mississauga are not included in this report. Figure 1 outlines the arterial roads under the jurisdiction of the Region of Peel in the City of Mississauga.

Data Limitations

Public Works

The Region of Peel obtains collision data for all Regional roads from the Ministry of Transportation through an Authorized Requestor Information Service (ARIS) agreement. This data is limited to collisions that have been reported to the police and may contain incorrect or missing information. Collisions that are still under investigation are not accessible for review and therefore not included in the analysis below. It should be noted that the collision data for 2020 is still being processed and may be incomplete and that the numbers reported may change. However, for the purpose of this report 2020 data has been included.

Collision History

An analysis of reported cyclist collisions was conducted for the Regional roads in the City of Mississauga between January 1, 2014 and December 31, 2020. Table 1 below summarizes the overview of cycling collisions reported by year and severity on Regional roads in the City of Mississauga.

During the review period of seven years from 2014 to 2020, 76 cyclist collisions were reported within the City of Mississauga on Regional roads. Nearly 36% of these collisions resulted in injury and three collisions resulted in fatal injury.

There was one fatal collision in 2014 at the intersection of Dixie Rd at Derry Rd and two fatal collisions occurred in 2020, one each at Dixie Rd at Blundell Rd and Dixie Rd at North Service Rd.

The cyclist incidents most commonly seen on Regional roads in the City of Mississauga involve a bicycle and an automobile. However, bicycle-bicycle collisions and bicycle-pedestrian collisions are often unreported.

Collision Trends

Almost all (99%) cyclist collisions reported on Regional roads in the City of Mississauga are occurring at intersections. Turning maneuvers accounts for more than half (64%) of all cyclist collisions.




Figure 2: Cyclist Collisions per Year in City of Mississauga on Regional Roads (2014 - 2020)

According to the collision data:

- 29% of drivers failed to yield the right of way to cyclists
- 3% of cyclists failed to yield the right of way to motor vehicles
- 1% of the drivers and 12% of cyclists disobeyed the traffic control.

The data also indicates that majority of cyclist collisions are occurring in clear environmental conditions (95%), dry road surface conditions (92%), and during daylight (63%).




Figure 4: Cyclist Collisions by Light Conditions on Regional Roads in City of Mississauga (2014 - 2020)

Cyclist collisions tend to occur during the summer months and mostly during the evening peak traffic period.

Figure 5: Cyclist Collisions by Month on Regional Roads in City of Mississauga (2014 - 2020)




Figure 6: Cyclist Collisions by Hour (starting) on Regional Roads in City of Mississauga (2014 - 2020)



Conclusion & Recommendations

Public Works

Since 2014, 76 cyclist collisions have been reported within the City of Mississauga on roads under the jurisdiction of the Region of Peel. Nearly 36% of these collisions resulted in injury and three collisions resulted in fatal injury. The majority (99%) of cyclist collisions reported on Regional roads in the City of Mississauga are occurring at intersections.

The long-term goal for the Region of Peel Vision Zero Road Safety Strategic Plan (RSSP) is "**zero fatal and injury collisions**". The short-term goal (2018 -2022) is "**10% reduction in fatal and injury collisions by 2022"**.

The Vision Zero RSSP focuses on six emphasis areas with the greatest opportunity for improvement, with cycling being one of the focus areas. The other emphasis areas are intersections, pedestrians, aggressive driving, distracted driving and impaired driving.

The goal of the Vision Zero Road Safety Strategic Plan is based on shared responsibility for road safety between municipalities, the police, community organizations and all road users – we all have a role to play. The Region is continuing to work proactively towards achieving our Vision Zero goals through the four 'E's of road safety strategy: engineering, education, enforcement, and empathy.

The Region created the Vision Zero Education and Awareness Working Group which is a sub-committee of the Vision Zero Task Force to better coordinate and deliver joint education, outreach and communication initiatives to raise awareness of pedestrian and cyclist safety in the Region.

Background

This memo summarizes the historical data of cycling collisions that occurred within the Mississauga, on both Regional and City owned roadways.

Data Correction

Please note, there has been a correction to the number of reported fatal cyclist collisions for 2014. In 2014, one fatal cyclist collision was reported on City of Mississauga owned/operated roadways (previously shown as zero) and one fatal cyclist collision was reported on the Region of Peel owned/operated roadways.

Collision Analysis

Data Limitations

This memo includes collision data from the Peel Regional Police. This data is limited to collisions that have been reported to the police and may contain incorrect or missing information. Collisions that are still under investigation are not accessible for review and therefore not included in the analysis below.

Collision History

The collisions outlined in this memo occurred within the city of Mississauga between January 1, 2014 and December 31, 2020. The data includes collisions that occurred on both Regional and City owned and operated roadways.

Collision Trends

During the study period, 602 cyclist collisions were reported within the city of Mississauga. Nearly half (46%) of these collisions resulted in injury and 5 collisions (0.8%) resulted in a fatality.

Since 2014, the frequency of collisions involving cyclists within Mississauga appears to be decreasing. However, collisions that are still under investigation are not accessible for review and therefore not included in this study. This may affect the results of the collision history and trends presented. The majority (78%) of cyclist collisions reported in Mississauga are occurring at intersections.




Figure 1 Cyclist Collisions in Mississauga by Year (Regional and City Owned Roadways)

Turning maneuvers pose a significant safety risk to cyclists as this movement type accounts for more than half (59%) of all cyclist collisions. According to the collision data, 13% of drivers failed to yield the right of way to cyclists and 12% of cyclists failed to yield the right of way to motor vehicles. 4% of drivers and 7% of cyclists disobeyed the traffic control.

The data also indicates the majority of cyclist collisions are occurring:

- In clear environmental conditions
- With dry road surface conditions
- During daylight
- During summer months
- During the evening peak traffic period

Conclusion

The collision review and analysis is the first step towards evidence based decision-making and strategies. The City and Region will continue to work together to advance this key Vision Zero action.

Since 2014, 602 cyclist collisions have been reported within the city of Mississauga on both Regional and City owned and operated roadways. Nearly half (46%) of these collisions resulted in injury and 5 collisions (0.8%) resulted in a fatality. The majority (78%) of cyclist collisions reported in Mississauga are occurring at intersections.

The AT COVID-19 Recovery Framework was approved by Council on July 9, 2020. The Framework included recommendations for various bicycle lane and separated bicycle lane projects, and concepts for Quiet Streets and Road Closures. This memo will provide an update on the implementation of the recommended bicycle lanes outlined in the Framework report.

Implemented to Date

Morning Star Drive, bicycle lanes, Airport Road to Brandon Gate Road

Bicycle lanes were installed from Airport Road to Brandon Gate Road in August. While bicycle lanes were feasible for most of the corridor, in some areas space and operational constraints limited staff's ability to implement bicycle lanes. In these areas, sharrows have been installed as an interim measure. Ongoing design work for streetscape and cycling improvements on Goreway Drive and Morning Star Drive will propose improvements to replace sharrows with formal linear infrastructure, to be implemented through a future capital project. Initial sign and markings deficiencies have been corrected.

King Street, Separated Bicycle Lanes, Camilla Road to Confederation Parkway

Bicycle lanes have been installed. Sharrows were installed in the western portion from Confederation Parkway to the pedestrian crossing and refuge island, until a future capital project can extend the formal linear infrastructure. Installation of physical separation is pending delivery of flexible bollards.

Queen Street, Bicycle Lanes, Britannia Road West to the plaza intersection north of Kerr Street Bicycle lanes have been installed. There is a short gap for the block north of Ontario Street on the east side to maintain 7 commercial parking spots.

Implementation Underway

Living Arts Drive, Separated Bicycle Lanes, Rathburn Road West to Burnhamthorpe Road West Work orders have been submitted. Installation is pending consistent nighttime warm weather for proper line markings removal and installation. Expected implementation is in April/May 2021.

Planning Underway

<u>Argentia Drive, Separated Bicycle Lanes, Tenth Line West to Derry Road West</u> Due to public feedback, the project is being redesigned to include a centre-turn lane. There are also conflicting lane closures due to MTO construction on Highway 401.

<u>Aquitaine Avenue, Separated Bicycle Lanes, Tenth Line West to Millcreek Avenue</u> A public consultation was held in March 2021, and there is currently a public feedback period in progress.

<u>Battleford Road, Separated Bicycle Lanes, Tenth Line West to Erin Mills Parkway</u> Concerns have been raised regarding traffic volumes. More planning and consultation is required for possible mitigation. This is being prioritized after Argentia and Aquitaine.

<u>Credit Valley Boulevard, Bicycle Lanes, Erin Mills Boulevard to Eglinton Avenue West</u> Regional construction originally slated for 2020 is proceeding in 2021, conflicting with installation at and near the Erin Mills intersection. Staff are looking at how to proceed with eastern section.

Orr Road, Bicycle Lanes, Southdown Road to Meadow Wood Road

This project was previously to be implemented. Due to public feedback, installation was cancelled, and the corridor is being redesigned in consultation with Road Safety to include traffic calming elements.

On Hold/Cancelled

<u>City Centre Drive, Separated Bicycle Lanes, Duke of York Boulevard to Rathburn Road West</u> Concerns have been raised regarding traffic capacity. More planning is required for mitigation.

Kariya Gate, Separated Bicycle Lanes, City Centre Drive to south of Burnhamthorpe Road West Concerns have been raised regarding traffic capacity. More planning is required for mitigation.

<u>Glen Erin Drive, Separated Bicycle Lanes, Burnhamthorpe Road West to Eglinton Avenue West</u> Concerns regarding traffic capacity could not be resolved. The bicycle lane project is canceled, and cycling infrastructure on this corridor is deferred to the 2023 capital project.



Whereas in 2017 Council passed a resolution to adopt Vision Zero;

And whereas, in 2018 Council passed a resolution to update Sustainable Transportation Strategy 2018-2022;

And whereas, in 2019 Council passed a resolution to adopt the Long Range Transportation Plan – "Let's Move Peel" which includes action items to support and encourage active mobility, address climate change, and mitigate community transportation greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions;

And whereas, on October 24, 2019, Regional Council passed a motion declaring a climate emergency outlining the Region of Peel's commitment to taking action on climate change;

And whereas, in 2019 Council welcomed the Region's first comprehensive Climate Change Master Plan including both mitigation and adaptation goals to reduce greenhouse gas emission 45 per cent by 2030 and 80 per cent by 2050;

And whereas, Peel Region saw a nearly four-fold increase in school participation in Peel's Bike to School Week between 2016 and 2019;

And whereas, in 2020 the Region of Peel saw a significant increase in demand for active transportation infrastructure;

And whereas, Peel Region has one of the highest diabetes rates in Ontario, one in eight adults, projected to rise to one in six by 2025 (the overall provincial rate being one in 12);

And whereas, investments in built environment neighborhoods that support active transportation and active mobility support residents in living to their full health and well-being;

And whereas, the Sustainable Transportation Strategy is a long-term plan which includes the full implementation of active transportation infrastructure by 2041;

And whereas, cycling and walking reduce GHG emissions, are more cost effective, and have enormous benefits in providing social determinants to health;

And whereas, the introduction and availability of electric bicycles and scooters have impacted active transportation in terms of offering a viable commuting option;

And whereas, on February 10, 2021 the Federal government announced \$14.9 billion of funding over the next eight years to support infrastructure projects as part a plan to create one million jobs, fight climate change, and rebuild a more sustainable and resilient economy,

And whereas, on March 12, 2021, the Federal government announced the first federal fund of \$400 million over five years dedicated to building active transportation to help build new and expanded networks of pathways, bike lanes, trails for cycling, waling and pedestrian bridges

Therefore be it resolved, that the Region of Peel commit to advancing Sustainable Active Mobility in 2021-2022.

And further, that staff engage with local advocates who regularly use existing active transportation infrastructure in order to recognize opportunities and priority projects that enhance the connectivity of active transportation networks across the Region;

And further, that Regional staff coordinate capital plans with local municipalities to identify and bring forward sustainable transportation projects through the annual budget process, thereby ensuring alignment in the delivery of priorities identified in the Sustainable Transportation Strategy;

And further, that Regional staff work with local municipalities to identify and prioritize gaps within and between the Regional and local active transportation networks on an annual basis;

And further, where grant programs support active transportation infrastructure projects, Regional staff prioritize applications for these funding sources, either separately or in joint application with local municipalities where opportunities arise.

And further, that staff work with the Credit Valley Conservation and the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority to facilitate prioritization of their respective active transportation projects;

And further, that staff report back to a future meeting of Regional Council on facilitating the use of electric bicycles and creating a campaign to educate the community on safe transportation etiquette;

And further, that staff report back to a future meeting of Regional Council regarding the status of implementation of Sustainable Active Mobility infrastructure and programs throughout the Region on a semi-annual basis
