- 5.1 <u>Glen Erin Drive Integrated Road Projects (Rory O'Sullivan, Transportation Project Engineer)</u>

Mr. O'Sullivan provided an update on the Glen Erin Drive Integrated Road Project and spoke to the potential vision zero improvements including intersection, pedestrian crossing and cycling improvements. Mr. O'Sullivan also spoke to the proposed design concepts and next steps. Mr. O'Sullivan responded to questions from Committee Members with respect to when bollards would be installed, their effectiveness, and the impact on winter maintenance operations and timelines.

At this time, Councillor Saito moved up item 9.3. - Cross Rides at Intersection:

Councillor Saito commented on cross rides at intersections and the issues relating to pedestrians crossing at those intersections, and advised that the Region of Peel would be installing multi use lanes along Erin Mills Parkway and that stop bars at intersections are placed further back, which is not a standard for the City of Mississauga. Collin Patterson, Supervisor, Road Safety explained the rationale for pedestrian crossings being closest to moving traffic at cross ride intersections, and noted that there is pavement markers and more material which should be more obvious to the motorists who are turning.

7. PUBLIC QUESTION PERIOD - 15 Minute Limit

Jonathan Giggs, Resident spoke to item 5.1 and noted that removing the bollards during the winter at the cross section of Glen Erin Drive, south of Battleford Road would make it unsafe for cyclists and hopes that staff will review this further. Mr. Giggs, further noted that Mr. O'Sullivan's presentation did not highlight any of the benefits of having pedestrian refuge islands and asked for Mr. O'Sullivan's comments.

Rory O'Sullivan, Transportation Project Engineer, noted that there are some benefits to pedestrian refuge islands as there are with other options, and advised that no options have yet been determined as staff are reviewing all options. Mr. O'Sullivan also noted that Operations and Maintenance staff are reviewing the options for the cross section at Glen Erin Drive, south of Battleford Road.

Sgt. Paul Dhillon, Peel Regional Police, noted that there are pedestrian safety concerns due to their exposure to being on a pedestrian refuge island so close to moving traffic.

Natalie Half, Resident inquired on the different type of infrastructure being implemented north and south of Battleford Road on Glen Erin Drive, and emphasized the importance of consistency of structures for cyclists. Councillor Saito explained that different infrastructure was necessary as a result of permitted roadway parking. Mr. O'Sullivan added that cyclists would not be transitioning from the cycle track to the cycle lane at the intersection; it would be a seamless transition.

Angie Melo, Legislative Coordinator will assist Erica Warsh, Project Manager, Vision Zero with coordinating a meeting between the Road Safety Committee and the Mississauga Cycling Advisory Committee.

Anna Phillips, Citizen Member, noted that having a calendar marking important dates of upcoming local and national events would be very helpful. Councillor Saito requested that Erica Warsh, Project Manager, Vision Zero work with Angie Melo, Legislative Coordinator on putting together a calendar to circulate to the Road Safety Committee Members.













(per 100,000 population)




