#### 6. PUBLIC QUESTION PERIOD - 15 Minute Limit

Jonathan Giggs, Resident spoke to item 5.1 and enquired about why there was not a proposed signalized intersection at Front Street and Lakeshore Road for the project. Shahrzad Nezafati, Dillon Consulting Ltd advised that she would look into the details to review the feasibility of a signalized intersection at Front Street and Lakeshore Road.

Natalie Halff, Resident spoke to item 5.2 regarding the proposed Cycling Network on table 6, noting 551 km of new cycling infrastructure and enquired if the 551 km included only Transportation and Works (T&W) projects, all City of Mississauga projects, or City/Region and MTO projects. Matthew Sweet, Manager, Active Transportation advised that table 6 included all projects in the City of Mississauga, including T&W, Community Services (CMS), regional and provincial projects for the lengths. However the costs only included City of Mississauga costs (T&W and CMS). Ms. Half further enquired for clarification for what the "upgraded km" column in table 6 showed. Mr. Sweet advised that the upgrade column meant that there were existing facilities of a different type that would be upgraded to the type in that column.

Glenn Voakes, Resident spoke to item 5.2 and enquired about how many kilometers of the 30.4 km reported are part of the Cycling Master Plan commitment. Matthew Sweet, Manager, Active Transportation advised that he would follow-up with Mr. Voakes with respect to the breakdown of the reported numbers.

Dorothy Tomiuk, Resident spoke to item 5.3 and enquired if the bus-only lane at the intersection of Hurontario Street and Elm Street could be painted red as a priority, and the white lane markings made clear due to the collision at that intersection. Ms. Tomiuk further enquired if there was a published City policy regarding cycling in bus-only lanes. Erica Warsh, Project Leader, Vision Zero advised that once the investigation was completed and the City learned more information about what led up to the collision at the intersection, then staff would look into what changes need to take place. Ms. Warsh further advised that cyclists are not permitted in the bus lay-bys, as they are only to be used by authorized City vehicles to stop, so that they do not impede traffic flow.

Kris Hammel, Citizen Member requested if staff could look into receiving a deputation from Metrolinx about the Hurontario Light Rail Transit (LRT) Project and Transit Project Assessment Process (TPAP) for the Dundas Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Project.

## CITY OF MISSISSAUGA ALL-WAY STOP POLICY REVIEW





## ALL-WAY STOP POLICY

- Purpose
  - A means of ensuring safe flow of traffic by controlling vehicle and pedestrian right-ofway at an intersection
- Council has requested that staff review the policy to provide more flexibility when reviewing local intersections



## ALL-WAY STOP TECHNICAL WARRANT

- TRAFFIC VOLUMES (TMC)
  - Based on total volume and volume split
    - 180 vehicles per hour
    - 1/3 volume split
- COLLISION FREQUENCY
  - 5 collisions per year
  - Turning movement or right-angle collisions



## ALL-WAY STOP CONSIDERATIONS

- NOT intended as a means to:
  - Control speeds
  - Protect pedestrians
  - Prevent through traffic
- Vision Zero
  - Focus on protecting vulnerable road users
  - Will consider as part of evaluation process



## ALL-WAY STOP REQUESTS

- Staff receive approximately 75-100 requests per year
  - Every intersection is reviewed
  - Rarely are warrants met
  - Approximately 15-20 all-way stops installed
    - Local support through Ward Councillor




## ALL-WAY STOP POLICY REVIEW

- Expand the warrant beyond technical
  - Public consultation to reflect the will of the local residents
  - Reduce the need for corporate reports
- Limit to isolated local-local intersections
  - Lower volumes
  - Lower impact on traffic patterns





## What We've Heard (So Far): Community and Industry Stakeholders

- Traffic Speed is an issue overall, but particularly on residential streets.
- There are many wide intersections that can be intimidating for pedestrians to cross.
- Distracted driving is an issue related to safety for all road users.
- Cycling does not feel safe for children and teenagers on streets.
   Protected cycling lanes may improve the feeling of safety for parents.
- New multi-use trails have been wellreceived by the community.

## What We've Heard (So Far): City of Mississauga Staff Workshops

- Safety is the top priority.
- Achieve balance and greater equality for all street users.
- Streets are complete only when they are safe and comfortable for people of all ages and abilities.
- Manage speed.
- Streets are recognized as public spaces and a community asset.
- Raise awareness about complete streets to ensure public support and buy-in.
- Shift from a roads-based to a streets-based approach.


## **OP Street Classification: Link Inputs**




## **OP Street Classification: Place Inputs**






