CITY OF MISSISSAUGA ALL-WAY STOP POLICY REVIEW





ALL-WAY STOP POLICY

- Purpose
 - A means of ensuring safe flow of traffic by controlling vehicle and pedestrian right-ofway at an intersection
- Council has requested that staff review the policy to provide more flexibility when reviewing local intersections



ALL-WAY STOP TECHNICAL WARRANT

- TRAFFIC VOLUMES (TMC)
 - Based on total volume and volume split
 - 180 vehicles per hour
 - 1/3 volume split
- COLLISION FREQUENCY
 - 5 collisions per year
 - Turning movement or right-angle collisions



ALL-WAY STOP CONSIDERATIONS

- NOT intended as a means to:
 - Control speeds
 - Protect pedestrians
 - Prevent through traffic
- Vision Zero
 - Focus on protecting vulnerable road users
 - Will consider as part of evaluation process



ALL-WAY STOP REQUESTS

- Staff receive approximately 75-100 requests per year
 - Every intersection is reviewed
 - Rarely are warrants met
 - Approximately 15-20 all-way stops installed
 - Local support through Ward Councillor




ALL-WAY STOP POLICY REVIEW

- Expand the warrant beyond technical
 - Public consultation to reflect the will of the local residents
 - Reduce the need for corporate reports
- Limit to isolated local-local intersections
 - Lower volumes
 - Lower impact on traffic patterns



School **Streets PEDESTRIAN** AND CYCLIST ZONE Mon - Fri 8:00 - 8:30 am 3:00 - 3:30 pm

- What are School Streets?
 - Creating car-free environments in front of schools at start and end of school day
 - Exemptions: Emergency vehicles, immediate residents, those who need additional mobility support
 - Making space and prioritizing safe conditions for walking and other active travel
 - Design reflects the needs of the local community





- What other examples exist?
 - Originated in Italy; broadly adopted across the UK and Denmark
 - Also: Seattle, Victoria, Toronto
 - Evidence of increased rates of AST/decreased driving, as well as broad community support where implemented
 - Can borrow lessons learned





- How are School Streets enforced?
 - Short term: Physical barriers, signs and volunteers
 - Residents within the zone, and those with accessibility concerns, receive special permits

Vision Zero

- This pilot will be an initiative of Mississauga's Vision Zero Plan
- Key points of alignment
 - Prioritizing vulnerable road users
 - Focus on safety



In a Vision Zero city, people can travel any way they choose without fear of injury or death. Risks will be proactively mitigated with the five 'Es' of road safety:

Engineering: prioritizing the safety of pedestrians, cyclists, and other vulnerable users when designing and operating streets

Education: enabling travellers to learn and follow best practices through road signs, social media, formal training, and other creative outreach and education tactics

Enforcement: ensuring there are consequences for breaking rules or taking unnecessary risks while travelling

Empathy: fostering concern for community members who are at risk or have been harmed while travelling

Evaluation: tracking and monitoring incidents, learning from the past to improve conditions in the future

People will be more conscious of their travel habits and the potential impact of making mistakes or poor choices. Mississauga will be committed to the Vision Zero principle: no loss of life is acceptable on roads in Mississauga.





Next Steps

- Seek endorsement from Traffic Safety Council
- Site Selection process is underway
- Communications plan to be developed this summer
- Outreach to schools in Fall 2021, for launch in Spring 2022

Overview - Let's Move, Mississauga

- Road Safety Committee and Traffic Safety Council partnered on Let's Move, Mississauga
- May 18-24, 2021 & coincided with Canada Road Safety Week
- Two campaigns, under "Let's Move, Mississauga"
 - TSC: Targeted campaign focused on Walk to School Event to encourage students to walk, bike or roll to school - for those learning virtually, get out and move
 - RSC: City-wide campaign focused on pedestrian safety to get road users outside and moving

Let's Move, Mississauga | Goals

- Encourage residents and students to get outside and walk, cycle, wheelchair or other forms of active transportation from May 18-24
- RSC: Raise awareness about pedestrian safety and encourage road users be safe when using a Mississauga roadway
- TSC: Promote a healthy lifestyle, reduce traffic/carbon emissions in school areas and encourage students to walk to school (or for those learning virtually, get out and move)
