

### WHO ARE WE?



The objective of Phase One ESA was to develop a preliminary determination of the likelihood that one or more contaminants have affected soil within the project area, to identify any Areas of Potential Environmental Concern (APECs) within the project area, and to identify Contaminants of Potential Concern (COPCs) via an examination of history of past uses. Accordingly, work was conducted in general accordance with O. Reg. 153/04, as amended

The Phase One ESA identified ten (10) APECs caused by one (1) on-site PCA and nine (9) offsite PCAs. The APECs have been illustrated on Figure 6.

On the basis of the above, in order to eliminate the potential for adverse environmental impact on the Phase One Property, a Phase Two Environmental Site Assessment would need to be conducted.

This diversion of traffic goes against City's Vision Zero strategy by redirecting traffic right towards our most vunerable users.


Alt. 6 will divert\* traffic to local residential side streets off of Bloor. This diversion puts more traffic in front of our most vunerable road users – children and seniors!



### **VISION ZERO - SAFETY**

Applewood Heights SS is a special safety issue. Currently, a drop-off/pickup issue exists with 4 lanes; with only 1 thru lane, vehicles will back up all the way to the intersection making the intersection unusable.

Eastbound visibility is somewhat obscured due to the change in grade and curvature of the road. (Fatal injury 2018)

# VISION ZERO - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ACT, R.S.O. 1990, C. H.8

# (ONTARIO.CA)

### Where highway divided into lanes

154 (1) Where a highway has been divided into clearly marked lanes for traffic,
(a) a vehicle shall not be driven from one lane to another lane or to the shoulder or
from the shoulder to a lane unless the driver first ascertains that it can be done safely;
(b) in the case of a highway that is divided into three lanes, a vehicle shall not be driven in
the centre lane except when overtaking and passing another vehicle where the roadway is
clearly visible and the centre lane is clear of traffic within a reasonable safe distance, or in
preparation for a left turn, or where the centre lane is at the time designated for the use of
traffic moving in the direction in which the vehicle is proceeding and official signs are erected
to indicate the designation;

(c) any lane may be designated for slowly moving traffic, traffic moving in a particular direction or classes or types of vehicles and, despite section 141, where a lane is so designated and official signs indicating the designation are erected, every driver shall obey the instructions on the official signs. R.S.O. 1990, c. H.8, s. 154 (1); 2015, c. 14, s. 45.

In the <u>Criminal Code of Canada</u>, the term <u>"highway"</u> is defined as "any road, street, avenue, parkway, driveway, square, <u>place</u>, bridge, viaduct or trestle, any part of which is intended for or used by the general public for the passage of vehicles." This definition encompasses a wide range of public roads and thoroughfares, including both paved and unpaved roads, as well as public areas that are intended for use by vehicles.






### **STUDY AREA -**

The sensitivity analysis concluded that approximately 66% (2/3) of vehicles using Bloor Street during the AM and PM peak hours do NOT originate from or are destined to locations within the Bloor Street corridor within the study area.

- In terms of location type, the intersections within the study area are experiencing more PDO collisions than predicted by the models, while the midblock segments are experiencing fewer collisions than similar midblock segments;







### Recommendations and Policy relevance

It is recommended that Mississauga increase the presence and frequency of transit services and consider providing feeder services to GO stations in the identified intervention areas. This study finds that, to minimize the usage of cars, transit services are not the only consideration. Transit must be complemented with improvements in zoning, land use, employment density, and population density.

The transit LOS, shown in **Exhibit 3**, remains at Level E along the corridor into the future, as the future roadway design does not include any transit priority measures or improvements.

# **Background**

A phased condominium is a condominium that is developed in stages and keeps increasing in size until the project is complete.

A phased condominium development starts with the registration of the declaration and description creating the initial units and common elements of the condominium. Afterwards, further units and/or common elements are added to the condominium by the registration of amendments to the declaration and description.

Collegeway Mississauga Holdings Limited (Sorbara) is the owner of a parcel of land described as part of 3355 The Collegeway, Block 1, Registered Plan 43M-695, which is being developed as a phased condominium at the north east corner of The Collegeway and Ridgeway Drive (see Location Map, Appendix 1). Collegeway Mississauga Holdings Limited (Sorbara) has previously registered the initial phase of its development as Peel Standard Condominium Plan (PSCP) 1160 and is now proceeding to register the second (final) phase, which when registered, will form part of PSCP 1160.

### Comments

In accordance with the Condominium Act, 1988, and Ontario Regulation 48/01, the registration of any amendments to the declaration and description for the subsequent phase of a condominium development cannot proceed without a Statement from the Municipality. This statement is required to confirm that the facilities and services associated with the next phase of development have been installed to ensure the independent operation of the condominium, or that sufficient securities have been posted to ensure the installation of services to ensure the independent operation of the condominium.

In regards to the second (final) phase of the Collegeway Mississauga Holdings Limited (Sorbara) phased condominium development, the City has received adequate securities to guarantee the completion of the facilities and services required to support the second (final) phase of the condominium development. As a result, staff is satisfied that the City can proceed with the signing of the Statement from the Municipality to be added to Schedule G of the condominium's declaration.

# **Financial Impact**

There are no financial impacts to the City associated with the approval of this report.

# **Conclusion**

Collegeway Mississauga Holdings Limited (Sorbara) is ready to register the second (final) phase of its phased condominium development. The City has received adequate securities to guarantee the completion of the services within the second (final) phase of the proposed condominium under File PSCP 1160; therefore, the City may proceed with signing of the Statement from the Municipality.

### Integrity Commissioner's Quarterly Report<sup>1</sup> City of Mississauga

Principles *Integrity* is pleased to submit this report, covering the period from March 2024, to the date of this report.

#### The Role of Integrity Commissioner, Generally:

An integrity commissioner's statutory role is to carry out, in an independent manner, the following functions:

- Advice on ethical policy development
- Education on matters relating to ethical behaviour
- Providing on request, advice and opinions to members of Council and members of Local Boards
- Providing, on request, advice and opinions to Council
- Provide a mechanism to receive inquiries (often referred to as 'complaints') which allege a breach of ethical responsibilities
- Resolving complaints, and
- Where it is in the public interest to do so, investigating, reporting and making recommendations to council within the statutory framework, while being guided by Council's codes, policies and protocols.

#### Confidentiality:

Much of the work of an Integrity Commissioner is done under a cloak of confidentiality. While in some cases secrecy is required by statute, the promise of confidentiality encourages full disclosure by the people who engage with us. We maintain the discretion to release confidential information when it is necessary to do so for the purposes of a public report, but those disclosures would be limited and rare.

The work of an Integrity Commissioner subdivides roughly into three categories:

- 1. Policy Development and Education
- 2. Advice
- 3. Complaint Investigation and Resolution

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup>Pursuant to Mississauga Council direction, the Integrity Commissioner reports to Council quarterly on complaints not within jurisdiction: The Integrity Commissioner shall report quarterly to City Council on complaints not within the jurisdiction of the Integrity Commissioner, but, where possible, shall not disclose information that could identify a person concerned.

#### Principles Integrity

This report focuses only on matters within the third category.

Our approach to reviewing complaints starts with a determination as to whether an inquiry to us is within our jurisdiction, is beyond a trifling matter, is not either frivolous or vexatious, and importantly, whether in its totality it is in the public interest to pursue. We always look to the possibility of informal resolution in favour of formal investigation and reporting. Once a formal investigation is commenced, the opportunity to seek informal resolution is not abandoned.

Where we are able to resolve a matter without concluding a formal investigation, our practice is to provide a written explanation in the form of a Disposition Letter to the complainant to close the matter. Often the respondent Member is involved in preliminary fact-finding and will also be provided with a summary of the disposition.

Where formal investigations commence, they are conducted under the tenets of procedural fairness and Members are confidentially provided with the name of the complainant and such information as is necessary to enable them to respond to the allegations raised.

The purpose of this quarterly report is to report on complaints received during the period covered by this report which were not within our jurisdiction, were not substantiated as Code contraventions, or were determined to be capable of resolution through course correction and were therefore concluded through disposition letter.

During the period covered by this report, a by-election was conducted for the office of Mayor and for Ward 5 Councillor, culminating on Election Day June 10, 2024. Four (4) members of Council registered as candidates for Mayor: Councillors Damerla, Dasko, Parrish and Tedjo.

The *Municipal Act* imposes a 'hiatus' on complaints to the Integrity Commissioner during an election campaign. That Act provides as follows:

Termination of inquiry when regular election begins

(7) If the Commissioner has not completed an inquiry before nomination day for a regular election, as set out in section 31 of the Municipal Elections Act, 1996, the Commissioner shall terminate the inquiry on that day.

#### Same

- (8) If an inquiry is terminated under subsection (7), the Commissioner shall not commence another inquiry in respect of the matter unless, within six weeks after voting day in a regular election, as set out in section 5 of the Municipal Elections Act, 1996, the person or entity who made the request or the member or former member whose conduct is concerned makes a written request to the Commissioner that the inquiry be commenced.
- (9) The following rules apply during the period of time starting on nomination day for a regular election, as set out in section 31 of the Municipal Elections Act, 1996, and ending on voting day in a regular election, as set out in section 5 of that Act:
- 1. There shall be no requests for an inquiry about whether a member of council or of a local board has contravened the code of conduct applicable to the member.

#### Principles Integrity

- 2. The Commissioner shall not report to the municipality or local board about whether, in his or her opinion, a member of council or of a local board has contravened the code of conduct applicable to the member.
- 3. The municipality or local board shall not consider whether to impose the penalties referred to in subsection (5) on a member of council or of a local board.

The rationale for the hiatus is to ensure that the Code of Conduct is not 'weaponized' against candidates during an election campaign period.

Applying this principle to the By-Election, no requests for inquiries (complaints) were processed by the Integrity Commissioner during the election campaign period, from April 26, 2024 being the close of nominations ('nomination day') to June 10, 2024 being Election Day, we declined to accept or process any complaints about any of the four (4) candidates who were members of Council.<sup>2</sup>

Other than those complaints about one of the four candidates which we declined to process during the election hiatus, there have been no other complaints received during the period covered by this report.

#### **Conclusion:**

We look forward to continuing to work with Members of Council to ensure a strong ethical framework. We embrace the opportunity to elevate Members' familiarity with their obligations under the Code and to respond to emerging issues. As always, we welcome Members' questions and look forward to continuing to serve as your Integrity Commissioner.

Though we favour providing Members and the public as much information about our role and activity as is possible, Council should appreciate the limits upon us to provide a full depiction of our activities. Our work is to be independent, and confidential, except when we report publicly. A general quarterly report represents the limit of the information that can be provided.

We wish to recognize the Members of Council who are responsible for making decisions at the local level in the public interest. It has been a privilege to assist you in your work by providing advice about the Code of Conduct and resolving complaints. We recognize that public service is not easy and the ethical issues that arise can be challenging. The public rightly demands the highest standard from those who serve them, and we congratulate Council for its efforts to meet that standard.

Finally, we wish to thank the Clerk and other City staff for their professionalism and assistance where required. Although an Integrity Commissioner is not part of the administrative hierarchy, the work of our office depends on the facilitation of access to information and policy in order to carry out the mandate.

### re: <u>No Applicable "Road-Diet-Crash-Lane" Industry Crash Risk Studies</u> (re: upcoming July 31 Council Review)

During the June 23, 2023 General Committee meeting, at 2:29:20 in the meeting video, Councillor Kovac referenced the basic accident risks associated with the road-diet-crash-lane approach in the context of the risk profile of Bloor St.. (also at elapsed time of 4:25 in the summary annotated video at <a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=WOOXTRViPFQ">https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=WOOXTRViPFQ</a>).

Those concerns have <u>not</u> been resolved and Council members and residents have been provided only with unsubstantiated assurances.

As part of the July 31 Council review of the approach to be taken for the Bloor St project (approach #5 vs #6), a key consideration would seem to be the lack of supporting industry case studies for the road-diet-crash-lane approach #6, and the potentially serious safety risk implications for residents.

For purposes of the July 31 Council review, and In the absence of transparent disclosures by Commissioner Wright, please refer to the attached pdf critique of comments as provided recently by the "City Advocate" on the Bloor St project, regarding applicable research reports and assumed accident frequency-severity implications for residents along Bloor St.

The attached also contains a section referencing <u>various cautions</u> noted in the research literature regarding the road-diet-crash-lane implications.

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#### 1. Quoting from City Advocate's Anonymous Social Media assertions May 27-29 2024

The context for the comments below was specific to Mississauga and specific to the Bloor St project. The City Advocate provided comments anonymously through social media.

#### **Resident Advocate:**

"... focusing on 'safety' by means of obstructing traffic and creating crash-zone lanes is problematic in the context of the lack of an overall coherent structure (e.g. public transit options that do not themselves obstruct the one-lane traffic) ... and doing so by fully disregarding the views of affected residents, including those who are faced with backing out of their driveways into the middle "crash-zone" lane. Alternative #5 DOES make the road safer (the argument of speed reduction with narrower lanes) AND makes it safer RELATIVE TO the crash-zone lane approach, while also providing a safer bike pathway."

#### **City Advocate:**

- "... the goal is to discourage car traffic. Discourage car traffic that the road and community was not designed to handle. I'll remind you, the Bloor Street Corridor has peoples' driveways (and schools) open up to it. "
- "... the goal of this project is not principally to benefit cyclists ... Alternative #5 ... is not a road diet and it provides pedestrians no physical protection from cyclists." ... "Providing bike lanes (was) more a means to an end, as well as an added bonus."
- "... collisions are reduced in road diet corridors primarily by replacing a travel lane with a center turn lane that mostly eliminates the conflict created by cars changing lanes to avoid queueing behind vehicles waiting to turn left into driveways and at intersections. " "... confident that by narrowing and reducing lanes, regional traffic (66% of all traffic using Bloor today) will move to higher-speed roads on Burnhamthorpe or Dundas: roads that were designed to handle them."
- "... I've seen ... first hand, some residents have concerns about this project and perhaps feel they weren't given the influence they wanted. But the way I see it, the job of government is not to make every single person happy. It is to make the most correct, evidence-based decision it can."

#### **Resident Advocate:**

"When you refer to "traffic that the road (Bloor St) was not designed to handle" - that design perspective somewhat contradicts the notion of dealing with that perceived

problem by instead proposing a road design that intends to dramatically reduce road capacity from two travel lanes each way to one travel lane each way, with the specific objective of increasing traffic congestion."

"You refer to "replacing a travel lane with a centre turn lane", but the crash zone (road diet) approach does not actually do that and in fact can increase collisions where:

- a) the one middle lane is in fact replacing two travel lanes going in opposite directions,
- b) the design change results in even heavier traffic congestion,
- c) the middle lane is now simultaneously shared by cars going in opposite directions,
- d) cars in both directions are allowed to continue to use that centre lane as a travel lane when their ... lane is obstructed by buses, parked ambulances, slow-moving cars, fallen garbage containers, errant cyclists, snow piles, etc.
- e) multiple residents in both directions simultaneously use that same centre lane for:
- i) backing out of driveways, ii) making left turns, iii) route for emergency vehicles and iv) using that centre lane as a secondary travel lane."
- "... a rationale for putting the onus on (locating) studies ... would be:
  - a) there are no studies that address the considerations as listed ...,
  - b) there is no incentive by City staff to make such studies available if Commissioner Wright's personal objective is to get on the "road diet (crash zone)" band wagon. It is discouraging when Commissioner Wright once again takes the position that the views of residents can be disregarded or misrepresented in order to meet his personal objectives."

#### **City Advocate:**

"You lament that "there are no studies that address the considerations". Every study I've cited addresses them because every study I've provided has a TWLTL (two-way-left-turn-lane) as part of its design. Every single one has tested for the variables you claim are so significant they cause crashes. And yet, they don't. Perhaps this is why **the city has** "no incentive" to make these studies available .... Because the studies exist, but the results you seem to be chasing simply do not."

"I have not addressed your "list of increased risks" directly, and there's a reason for that. I've provided you a list of studies that tests for these "risks" themselves. I feel far more confident trusting peer-reviewed journal articles than my personal opinions on the matter. ... if the risks you have highlighted are so significant, why don't they appear in any (that I've read) impact analysis on any road diet anywhere else in the world? ... A rational approach, the one I believe I have taken, is to place the evidence first and allow that to lead to a conclusion. You have taken the opposite approach in this conversation at least, trying to make the facts fit whatever preconceived notions you have about TWLTLs."

"At the end of the day, you have zero evidence that road diets are more dangerous. Until you do, I am not going to continue this debate."

#### 2. Critique of road-diet-crash-lane industry studies identified by City Advocate

First consider the following July 18 2024 distributed list that more extensively identifies the sort of multiple risk profile considerations applicable to Bloor St in Mississauga, and that are <u>not</u> taken into account by transportation industry "road-diet-crash-lane" case studies, and which could, in turn, imply a reckless increase in the structural risk for serious injury or even death of residents.

(per July 18, 2024 distribution email, again noting the lack of supporting case studies)

#### Risk profile considerations for Bloor St, in combination with the "crash lane" feature:

- 1. urban, not rural
- 2. residential, not commercial or industrial
- 3. TWLTL\* in context of 2 other lanes and not 4 other lanes
- 4. high population access
- 5. **high driveway density** (residential)
- 6. design intention to maximize congestion at peak periods
- 7. residents exiting driveways backwards
- 8. **no buffer lane on right** for delivery trucks, stopped vehicles etc
- 9. conflict re ambiguous right-of-way in centre lane
- 10. using centre lane as a passing lane in both directions
- 11. school drop-off line-ups adding to congestion
- 12. in context of also navigating bike lanes
- 13. pedestrians wrongly perceiving centre lane as "safe zone"
- 14. crash risk & cost type/severity more important than simple numerical counts
- 15. prior experience of very long lineups during construction periods
- 16. etc
- 17. absence of case studies taking account of Bloor St risk profile
- 18. discrediting and disregarding personal insights of Bloor St residents
- \*TWLTL centre two-way left turn lane (but becomes a shared "crash lane" in this context). .

#### Critique of the five studies anonymously cited by the City Advocate as at May 29 2023:

The following five research reports were those identified by the City Advocate May 29, 2023 as the basis for assertions regarding the expected crash frequency effect of the road-diet-crash-lane approach for Bloor St, with no acknowledgment of the risk profile implications for a potential increase in the occurrence-severity of significantly more-serious accidents. In general, references to such studies, and sometimes the studies themselves, seem propaganda-based with an unreasonable advocacy objective that disregards common sense and the views of residents:

1. "Iowa's Experience with Road Diet Measures - Use of Bayesian Approach to Assess Impacts on Crash Frequencies and Crash Rates" (2006)

<u>Critique</u>: the City Advocate's assertions regarding crash frequency stats were based on these Iowa studies from 1982 to 2004 that "were predominately on US or State routes in small urban towns with an average population of 17,000". Not particularly relevant to Bloor St, even without taking into account other risk profile considerations such as commercial vs. residential roadways. This Iowa research report is not readily accessible

online (nor by request to the authors) but is one of only two sources that also form the basis for the 2008 "Accident Modification Factors" research report, as per details provided in 2008 Appendix C, and would seem similarly irrelevant there as well.

2. "Take the High (Volume) Road: Analyzing the Safety and Speed Effects of High-Traffic-Volume Road Diets" (Sept 2023)

<u>Critique</u>: The City Advocate's broad generalization on crash reductions were based on somewhat spurious results related to only five relatively small sections of roadway in Los Angeles (mainly commercial). No before-and-after analysis was involved and instead an apple-and-oranges comparison of the combined accident rates on these five Los Angeles sections of roadway that had road diets (primarily commercial), compared to the combined accident rates on 16 other roadways without road diets. Two small subsections of those road-diet roadways were residential (approx 0.5 miles in total, out of 3 miles) but no separate before-and-after analysis nor comparison analysis provided. In any case, each small residential section had wide buffer lanes on the right accommodating on-street parking, etc. No stats applicable to the Bloor St risk profile.

3. "Reconfiguring Urban Undivided Four-Lane Highways to Five-Lane: A Nonideal but Very Effective Solution for Crash Reduction" (Oct 2020)

<u>Critique</u>: The City Advocate's assertions of crash reduction factors based on this research report, appear to have no particular relevance to Bloor St because it involves adding a middle section while retaining two dedicated travel lanes in each direction.

4. "Urban Four-Lane Undivided to Three-Lane Roadway Conversion Guidelines" (Aug 2003)

<u>Critique</u>: The City Advocate references crash reduction factors mentioned in this report that the introduction to this report itself acknowledges are grossly overstated and **not** statistically valid.

**Instead**, the introduction to this report references a much lower aggregated crash reduction factor from a different report, but then goes on to state that further analysis that "controlled for factors like volume and study period showed ... **no significant difference** in crash severity and crash type 'before' and 'after' this type of conversion".

<u>However</u>, even the conclusion of "no significant difference" does not make distinctions regarding the various risk profile considerations that could in fact result in a <u>material</u> <u>increase</u> in the occurrence-severity of significantly more-serious accidents with a road-diet-crash-lane approach in the context of a risk profile comparable to Bloor St.

5. "Costs and benefits of a road diet conversion" (2025)

<u>Critique</u>: Although the City Advocate references this research report as his source for a crash reduction factor, that report simply sources the factor from a separate 2013 FHA "synthesis" report, which in turn sources the factor from a separate 2013 New York report. That 2013 New York report "Safety countermeasures and crash reduction in New York City—Experience and lessons learned" (Chen) does not appear to be readily accessible online. The indirect nonsubstantive source reference, combined with the difficulties in accessing the report would suggest that the City Advocate may have no knowledge of the basis for the applicability of that factor to the Bloor St risk profile.

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#### 3. Addendum - Some cautions as noted in road diet research studies

"A TWLTL that leads to the loss of a passing lane needs careful evaluation." **source:** 2009-11 - Highway Safety Manual Knowledge Base

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Genesee County Michigan "assessed (and prioritized) every 4-lane road ... for potential of conversion to 3 lanes ... (and) encouraged ... a low-cost Road Diet (approach) by restriping existing 4-lane segments to three lanes and (after a trial period) if the conversion (was) not operating as desired or publicly accepted, the road (could) be restriped back to the original layout."

The following study (road diet on two lane roads) illustrates the **rural vs. urban** risk profile difference for road diets, and without considering that the accidents may have greater severity and without taking account of other risk factors such as driveway density:



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"Sites with lower crash reduction factors (CRFs) generally had higher traffic volumes, suggesting the possibility of diminishing safety benefits as traffic volumes increase." **source**: 2014 - Road Diet Informational Guide (FHWA)

... getting past the semantics here, the observation would be that <u>crash risks increase</u> when there are higher volumes <u>relative to the road capacity of the road</u> and residents are allowed to use the crash-lane as a passing lane.

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This study illustrates cautions in interpreting studies. It starts out evaluating rural vs. urban and head-on collisions and then drops the urban component when the results are not favourable but concludes with a table #4 that does not clearly identify the exclusion of urban applications. The

study also looks at the costs of accidents (relative to construction costs) but does not consider reduced life expectancy and death to be "costs" except in terms of hospital and funeral costs. **reference:** 2008 - summary of safety of TWLTL on 2-lane roads

"high-volume road diet corridors ... are implicitly discouraged by current FHWA guidance and, in turn, by many local policies ... this, perhaps ironically, limits our ability to analyze them" **source**: 2023 - Analyzing the Safety and Speed Effects

... similarly there seems to be difficulty finding case studies the correspond to the safety risk profile of Bloor St

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Road diet studies typically are not objective "before and after" studies, but the "before and after" label is still used to describe the apples-and-oranges comparison of the accident experience of roads with road diets with a different set of roads not using that approach. The industry seems reluctant to use more objective "before and after" studies.

**reference:** various studies

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Accident modification factors for road diets: a) do not appear to consider severity of accident, b) do not appear to consider differences in risk profiles, and c) FWIW, a volume "normalization" ( $\lambda$  lambda) process seems to adjust for the fact that accidents should be numerically lower simply because volumes would inevitably be lower and thereby should avoid hiding increases in the relative rate of accidents arising from increased congestion and the use of the crash-lane as a passing lane. Increases in severity of accidents are generally not part of the studies.



WHEREAS the City's two-year Urban Hen Pilot Program concluded on May 5, 2023 with a continued ban on keeping urban hens in the City of Mississauga;

AND WHEREAS Ward 11 was not included in the pilot, and a residence in Ward 11 came to the attention of Animal Services by complaint for the keeping of a prohibited species;

AND WHEREAS Mr. Eric McLaughlin, a resident of Ward 11 and the property owner of 1117 Carding Mill Place, has been keeping urban hens on his property, as family pets, since 2021:

AND WHEREAS the immediate neighbours have been aware of the pet urban hens without objection, currently providing letters of support indicating that they are not disturbed by the presence of the pet urban hens on the property;

AND WHEREAS the Urban Hen Pilot participants are permitted to keep their current hens in the locations approved by the City in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Pilot Program until the end of their natural lifespan;

AND WHEREAS the only way to allow the owner to continue keeping the pet urban hens at his property would be for Council to pass a unique exemption crafted to ensure it applies to this one property and owner only;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT Mr. Eric McLaughlin be granted a unique exemption from Animal Care and Control By-law 98-04, as amended prohibiting the keeping of pet urban hens on his current property, located at 1117 Carding Mill Place, in accordance with the following:

- a) The exemption only allows the keeping of Mr. Eric McLaughlin's four (4) current pet urban hens, or fewer at 1117 Carding Mill Place, until the end of their natural lifespan;
- b) The exemption does not allow the keeping of male chickens/roosters;
- c) The exemption allows the keeping of pet urban hens in an outdoor enclosure that is exempt from the requirements in section 22(1)(b) of the Animal Care and Control By-law 98-04, as amended;

- d) Mr. Eric McLaughlin shall keep the pet urban hens in an outdoor enclosure that meets all the applicable requirements set out in section 22(1)(a) and section 23 of the Animal Care and Control Bylaw 98-04, as amended;
- e) Mr. Eric McLaughlin remains subject to all other requirements of the Animal Care and Control By-law 98-04, as amended.

WHEREAS, extreme weather, such as short-duration high-intensity storm events, have been predicted to increase as a result of climate change;

AND WHEREAS, a 100-year storm event passed through Mississauga on July 16th, 2024 delivering 106mm of total rainfall;

AND WHEREAS, the total rainfall from the July 16th event is equivalent to the average total rainfall within the month of July, but fell within two hours;

AND WHEREAS, considerable flooding occurred throughout the City, both on public lands but also substantively on private lands;

AND WHEREAS, hazardous conditions were created due to flooding, such as at the Tyndall Seniors Village where emergency services were required to utilize rafts to evacuate the residents:

AND WHEREAS, in the past 20 years, there have been three other 100-year storm events striking Mississauga causing extensive flooding and damage to both public and private lands, including on August 19<sup>th</sup>, 2005 delivering 130mm of total rainfall, and approximately \$500 million in damages, August 20<sup>th</sup>, 2009 delivering 120mm of total rainfall, and approximately \$500 million in damages, July 8th, 2013 delivering 121mm of total rainfall and approximately \$1 billion in damages;

AND WHEREAS, the City has and continues to invest strategically and heavily in storm water management and climate mitigation through funding of the Capital Plan by the Storm water Charge for initiatives such as Cooksville Flood Mitigation projects, Lisgar Storm water Pumping Stations, the Little Etobicoke Creek Flood Evaluation Study and the Dixie-Dundas Flood Mitigation project;

AND WHEREAS, there are many potential strategic investments that can be made for storm water mitigation.

LET IT BE RESOLVED THAT, Staff report back to Council in September based on the findings related to the July 16th storm event and provide commentary on immediate, short term, midterm and long-term actions the City should consider in regard to matters in and outside the Capital Plan;

AND FURTHER THAT, the City will continue to collaborate with the Region of Peel, the Toronto Region Conservation Authority, the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, Conservation Halton and any other stakeholders committed to actions and solutions that will mitigate flooding and provide flood protection to residences, businesses and public and private lands;

AND FURTHER THAT, the City hold debrief sessions together with the above-captioned stakeholders regarding the flood event on July 16, 2024 which includes exploring opportunities/measures to reduce flood risk and minimize flood impacts and associated costs such as, for example, improved flood forecasting and monitoring systems, flood detection and emergency operations alert and emergency management;

AND FURTHER THAT, the City hold a public information session in September to provide a review of the July 16, 2024 storm and to educate residents and business owners on the City's stormwater infrastructure and how it is intended to function, investments made and planned,

flood prevention tips, programs and subsidies that are available, and related information to equip residents in mitigating impacts of potential future flood events;

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24 Stavebank Road is a large church on the west side of Stavebank on the north side of High Street East.

#### Statement of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest

Built in 1927, the property has design and physical value as it is a rare example of Modern Gothic architecture in Mississauga. The property has historical value due to its association with a longstanding Presbyterian community and the significant Port Credit figures who established it. It is also valued for its memorialization of World War One soldiers and GTA and local architects Dolphin and Cotton. The property has contextual value as a landmark that is physically, functionally, visually and historically linked to its surroundings, including the 1925 cenotaph across the street. The church is also important in defining, maintaining and supporting the character – a campus of religious and recreational institutions on the east bank of the Credit River – of the area.

### **Heritage Attributes**

- The location and visibility of the 1927 building from Port Credit Memorial Park, High Street East and Stavebank Road – contributes to the property's contextual value
- Credit Valley stone material on the 1927 portion of the building contributes to the property's contextual value
- The monochromatic colour of the 1927 portion of the building contributes to the property's physical and design value
- Rectilinear cross shape and form with inset gable roof and cross gable ends of the original 1927 building – contributes to the property's physical and design value
- The buttresses with smooth caps of the original 1927 building contributes to the property's physical and design value
- The rectilinear and Gothic inspired stained glass windows, window and door decorative quoining surrounds and voussoirs of the original 1927 building – contributes to the property's physical and design value
- Cornerstone with engraved "St. Andrew's Memorial Presbyterian Church A.D. 1927"
- The chimney on the original 1927 building contributes to the property's physical and design value
- The soffits with rafter tail motif of the original 1927 building contributes to the property's physical and design value
- The smooth horizontal stringcourse, indicating division of floors on the original 1927 building contributes to the property's physical and design value
- The copper trim on the original 1927 building contributes to the property's physical and design value
- Octagonal bell tower with geometric lancet stone tracery contributes to the property's physical and design value
- Bell, dedicated to World War I veterans and sons of John Gray, one of the church founders, Lieutenants Angus Douglas and Andrew Gray (dedications inscribed on bell) – contributes to the property's historical and associative value
- The double wooden front doors with decorative metal hinges, lancet windows and knockers of the original 1927 building – contributes to the property's physical and design value
- The doors set in a keystone arch with the crest of St. Andrew in the centre contributes to the property's physical and design value
- The asymmetrical front with a false top on the south corner with cross and two square floral blocks – contributes to the property's physical and design value
- Historic wood south side entrance with decorative shield over the door lintel and a
  wooden door with decorative hinges contributes to the property's physical and design
  value
- Vertical niches in gables contributes to the property's physical and design value

Design attributes include:

- Two storey structure with its depth being of similar dimensions to its width contributes to the physical and design value

#### **Description of Property** – Riverbend: 2470 Jarvis Street

Riverbend is a two-storey house, including attached garage, on the west side of Jarvis Street at the start of the curve when heading south, in what was the original Erindale Village. Originally located at the very end of Jarvis Street, it was moved to its current location in 1973.

#### **Statement of Cultural Heritage Value of Interest**

The property has design value as it is a representative example of the French (colonial/provincial) style of architecture. This style is identified by narrow windows and doors and steeply pitched roofs with either hipped or side gables. This style can also include narrow dormers and doors framed by simple narrow surrounds. This architectural style is rare in Mississauga with only one other known example.

This property has historical and associative value, as the architect who designed this house was Allward & Gouinlock. This architectural firm owned by Hugh Lachlan Allward and G. Roper Gouinlock won numerous awards both nationally an internationally for their designs. Their firm was one of first to introduce a modernist aesthetic to institutional buildings in post-war Toronto and was responsible for the design of Mississauga's Small Arms Inspection Building.

#### **Description of Heritage Attributes**

Design attributes include:

- Steep pitched hipped roof contributes to the cultural heritage value of the property because it is associated with the French style of architecture
- Narrow windows contributes to the cultural heritage value of the property because it is associated with the French style of architecture
- Stone Façade contributes to the cultural heritage value of the property because it is associated with the French style of architecture
- Tall narrow hipped dormers contributes to the cultural heritage value of the property because it is associated with the French style of architecture
- Tagged door surround contributes to the cultural heritage value of the property because it is associated with the French style of architecture
- Asymmetrical stone chimney placement contributes to the cultural heritage value of the property because it is associated with the French style of architecture
- Asymmetrical placement of window and door apertures contributes to the cultural heritage value of the property because it is associated with the French style of architecture
- Decorative pediment entablature contributes to the cultural heritage value of the property because it is associated with the French style of architecture

#### A By-law to designate a Municipal Capital Facility

**WHEREAS** section 110(1) of the *Municipal Act*, 2001, S.O. 2001, c. 25, as amended (the "*Municipal Act*") provides that council of a municipality may enter into agreements for the provision of municipal capital facilities ("Municipal Capital Facilities") with any person;

**AND WHEREAS** section 110(6) of the *Municipal Act* provides that council of a municipality may enact by-laws exempting property or a portion of it from taxation for municipal and school purposes on which Municipal Capital Facilities are or will be located;

**AND WHEREAS** subsection 2(1) of O. Reg 603/06 prescribes classes of Municipal Capital Facilities which may be exempt from taxation under section 110(6) of the *Municipal Act*, including public libraries;

**AND WHEREAS** The Corporation of the City of Mississauga (the "City") has entered into a Retail Lease dated May 14, 2024 with Calloway Reit (Mississauga) Inc. (the "Municipal Capital Facilities Agreement"), as authorized by Bylaw 0004-2024, for the provision of a Municipal Capital Facility, located on a portion of the property municipally known as 2150 Burnhamthorpe Road West, in the City of Mississauga, as further described on Schedule "A" attached hereto (the "Property"), that it intends to exempt the Property from taxation for municipal and school purposes;

**AND WHEREAS** the Council of the City hereby deems it appropriate to exempt the Property from taxation for municipal and school purposes;

#### NOW THEREFORE the Council of the City ENACTS as follows:

- 1. That the Property, as depicted in the sketch attached hereto as Schedule "B", is hereby designated a Municipal Capital Facility and is exempt from taxation for municipal and school purposes pursuant to Section 110 of the Municipal Act, 2001, S.O. 2001, c. 25, as amended, effective as of the date the term of the Municipal Capital Facilities Agreement is to commence.
- 2. That any of the lands that are legally described on Schedule "A" but are not depicted on Schedule "B" are lands that continue to be subject to taxation for municipal and school purposes.
- 3. That the Municipal Capital Facilities Agreement is hereby ratified as a municipal capital facilities agreement made pursuant to Section 110 of the *Municipal Act*, 2001.
- 4. That the Clerk be directed to notify the Minister of Education, Municipal Property Assessment Corporation, the Regional Municipality of Peel and the secretary of any school board which includes the land exempted, of the enactment of this By-law.
- If any section or portion of this By-law is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, it is the intent of the Council of the City that all remaining sections and portions of this By-law continue in force and effect.

6. That Schedules "A" and "B" attached hereto form an integral part of this By-law.


