This year the 2023 Ontario Heritage Conference is being held in London, Ontario from June 15 to June 17, 2023. Conference details can be found here:

Approval will be required for a maximum of two Citizen Members of the Heritage Advisory Committee to attend. The full conference fee for two members would be approximately \$450.00 (with the early bird rate of \$275.00 per person which expires May 15 and becomes a rate of \$325 per person); accommodation is \$155.00 per night plus tax and for the full conference for two people would be approximately \$700.00; per diem amount (\$75.00 per day) of approximately \$300.00; and travel costs of approximately \$550.00, for a total approximate cost of \$2,000.00.

Travel costs are based on mileage however an option is open to take the Via train at a discounted rate.

The expenditure will subsequently require approval by General Committee and adoption by Council.
