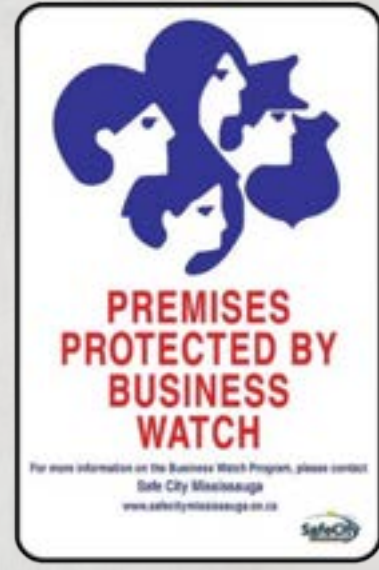

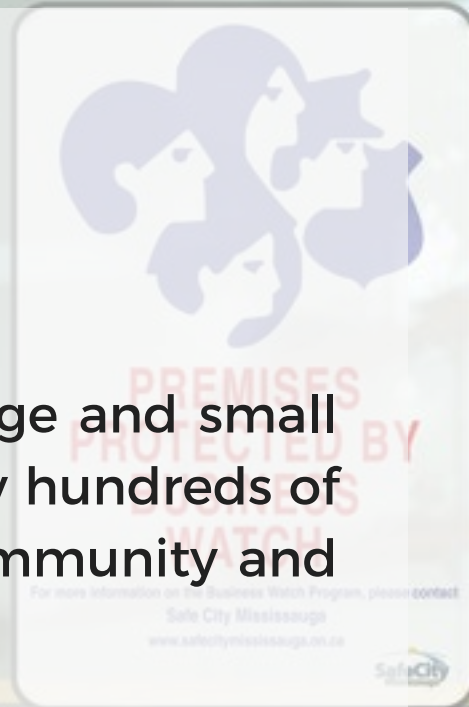

OPERATION CLEAN SWEEP

In 2022, we supported three Operation Clean Sweeps. The goal of Operation Clean Sweep is to help make Mississauga safer by cleaning up graffiti and litter to help reduce criminal activity. Rapid removal and clean up is one of the most effective strategies a community can carry out to significantly reduce or even eliminate vandalism and graffiti. Removing graffiti sends a message to those committing the crime that it is not tolerated and indicates that the area is being supervised.

NEW COURSES

We are strong proponents of education being the catalyst for long term, sustainable change and development. Thanks to generous support from the Ontario Trillium Foundation and the Government of Canada's Canada Summer Jobs Grant, We were able to create two new courses for Neighbourhood Watch teams to be informed on key issues affecting our community - Senior Safety and Intimate Partner Violence. These courses will equip members with the knowledge and tools they need to effectively identify, report and help support victims of crime.

SCHOOL WATCH

School Watch provides an opportunity for Mississauga high school students to participate in community safety and well-being.

Youth learn best when they feel safe and prepared. By equipping them with the knowledge and skills they need to conquer "adulthood" and keep themselves safe, their learning thrives and they are empowered to achieve their goals.

Through this program, we offer online courses and in-person workshops to support youth in building life skills, and understanding the importance of graduating high school and keeping a clean criminal record. We organize school and community clean-up events so students can earn volunteer hours and help make their community a safer place to live, work, and play.

In 2023, School Watch will continue growing and collaborating to improve safety and well-being for young people in our city!

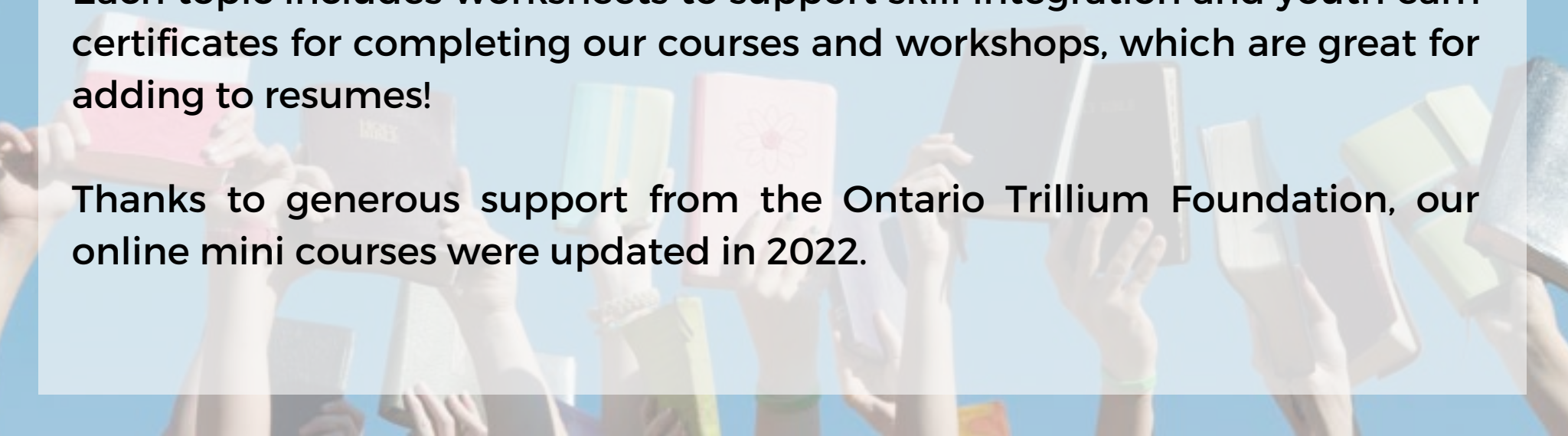
YOUTH LIFE SKILLS

It's more important than ever for the next generation to understand how to manage their finances, critically evaluate information, chart their academic and career paths, and live a healthy and balanced lifestyle.

Through early intervention in the lives of youth, we enhance their knowledge of life skills and promote positive decision-making. The content is offered in two formats: online mini courses and in-person workshops.

Each topic includes worksheets to support skill integration and youth earn certificates for completing our courses and workshops, which are great for adding to resumes!

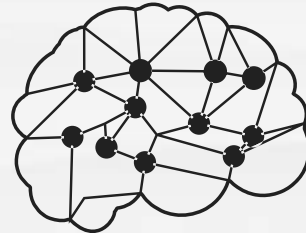

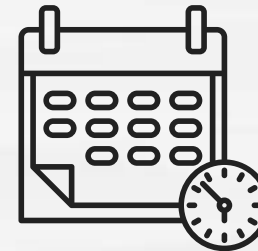

ASPIRE TUTORING

For 12 years, the Aspire program led in innovation by empowering youth through free one-to-one tutoring designed to help them excel academically, gain mentorship and fall in love with learning. Aspire filled a service gap by making high quality tutoring accessible to thousands of students in communities across Mississauga at a time when tutoring supports were limited.

During the pandemic, school boards began offering free tutoring support to their students - this inspired us to use this as an opportunity to re-evaluate and reimagine the Aspire program to reflect the new needs of our students.

Aspire's positioning in the education space will look different but our dedication to Mississauga students and seeing them thrive academically remains clear and steadfast!

CAMPAIGNS



#FUTUREGRAD

Education = empowerment. Our goal is to see every student in Mississauga graduate high school and use their education to open the door to a bright career, future and life. Our #FutureGrad Grad 101 course gives students a leg up by delving into the requirements for graduating from secondary school in Ontario, information on specialized programs like OYAP and SHSM and alternative learning options like night school.

WHAT

WHY

- Students that are engaged in school and succeed in graduating are less likely to engage in crime
- 40,000 Canadian students drop out of school every year
- 1 in 3 high school dropouts leave after Grade 9 or less
- Over 80% of the inmates in federal jails are dropouts.

#GRAFFITI-FREE CITY

The #Graffiti-Free City campaign promotes a cleaner community and includes our three Counter-Act: Graffiti and Vandalism Prevention courses for youth, neighbourhoods and businesses. Our youth course explains three common myths about vandalism and provides alternative ideas for expressing political views or creativity. Our neighbourhood and business courses detail how to prevent and respond to vandalism around residential and commercial properties.

WHAT

WHY

Graffiti and vandalism need to be reported and cleaned up quickly. If left unreported, graffiti leaves the impression that no one cares, leading to increased graffiti and crime. It can also contribute to a loss of business, growth and tourism and a reduction in property values. Cleaning up graffiti also diverts tax dollars from social services. Through this campaign, we're mobilizing the community and taking on the groundwork necessary to create a graffiti-free Mississauga.

CRIME PREVENTION CONFERENCE

Keynote Speaker - Dr. Joel Caplan



Dr. Joel Caplan works with cities and towns to prevent crime, improve community policing, and make data-informed decisions that enhance public safety.

He specializes in GIS mapping and crime pattern analysis, and co-developed Risk Terrain Modeling (RTM). RTM diagnoses environmental features that connect with crime. It helps people develop the best strategies for crime deterrence and prevention.

Joel is a Professor at Rutgers University School of Criminal Justice (SCJ) and serves as Director of the SCJ Master's Program and Director of the Rutgers Center on Public Security (RCPS).

Joel has published over 40 peer-reviewed journal articles and two books, "Risk-Based Policing: Evidence-Based Crime Prevention with Big Data and Spatial Analytics" (2018) and "Risk Terrain Modeling: Crime Prevention and Risk Reduction" (2016). His research on communities, crime and policing empowers multiple stakeholders with evidence to maximize resources and create safer and more secure environments.

HERO AWARDS

Community Organization Award Winner: Applewood Road Neighbourhood Watch



The Applewood Road Neighbourhood Watch has demonstrated all the core principles and ideals of the Neighbourhood Watch program. Though activating right at the peak of the pandemic in spring 2020, their Neighbourhood Watch has immediately flourished. Since their activation, they have successfully organized several charity drives that raised nearly 4000 pounds of food and clothing, collaborated with municipal leaders to build a neighbourhood Little Library, petitioned to implement the Slow Streets program in their community, and organized a successful neighbourhood garage sale that raised funds for Ukrainian relief. Under the leadership of Kimberlee Hutchison and Darlene Devane, the Neighbourhood Watch members have all successfully collaborated to become a safe and connected community.

The examples listed above all demonstrate dedication to their community, initiative, and creativity. Everything this community does is in the interest of keeping their neighbourhood safe, connected, and vibrant. It has been a consistent team effort - every Watch member participates as much as they can whether that's a small contribution to the charity drive (though one resident even knitted more than 100 mitts and scarves to donate!) or volunteering skills to help construct the Little Library, and especially when it comes to reporting crime.

RISK TERRAIN MODELING

Crime Prediction and Risk Reduction



Risk Terrain Modelling (RTM)

In 2022, we continued to build our capacity to implement Risk Terrain Modelling in our crime prevention strategies, as well as introduce this revolutionary approach to Canada.

Risk Terrain Modelling consists of diagnosing environmental conditions that may lead to crime. It seeks to examine the environment to determine where and why crime is happening in specific locations.

Data Repository Project

Thanks to funding from the Region of Peel, Safe City Mississauga completed a project to acquire shapefiles needed to conduct Risk Terrain Modelling.

RTM WORKSHOP

On October 27th, we partnered with SIMSI to host the first ever Risk Terrain Modelling Workshop in Canada, facilitated by the co-founder of the software, Dr. Joel Caplan.

The workshop was an in-depth demonstration of how to diagnose why crime occurs in certain places and times.
