# Our Story





2006

Ecosource opens its first community garden on public land in Mississauga 2010

The Iceland Teaching Garden, a 15,000 square-foot urban farm, is launched 2014

Ecosource's formal partnership with the City of Mississauga on community gardens begins 2022

Mississauga's Urban Agriculture Strategy is approved, identifying community gardens as a key component 2023



Elementary School.


With the City's support, we plan to add at least 1 new garden to our network each year.

### **New Garden Beds!**

This year we installed 46 new garden beds! This included a unique herb spiral demonstration bed at the Parkway Green Generation Garden, 12 replacement beds at Forest Glen and Hillside Community Gardens and 33 new garden beds at the Forest Glen Community Garden to welcome new partners and gardeners to our network!







### **Youth Engagement**

Many of our programs this year were led by youth for youth! This year the Indigenous Network expanded their Wasa-Nabin youth program to include Forest Glen as well as Parkway Green. Student volunteers engaged at the Forest Glen Community Garden in 2022 led their own stewardship sessions in 2 garden beds this year. Youth were also highly represented amongst our volunteer groups at the Iceland Teaching Garden and Malton Community Garden this year.

## **Benefits of Gardening**

Ecosource conducts an annual survey with our garden members. A preliminary analysis of the 2023 results shows that our gardens have many co-benefits for participants, including:

#### **Food Security**

- 89% report "growing food to eat" as a key benefit
- 76% say the program helps them save on the cost of groceries
- 76% make 3+ meals/week with their garden harvest with 25% making more than 6 meals/week

#### Other Benefits

- 87% indicate the program improves their gardening skills
- 86% feel they can share their knowledge with others through the program
- 85% say the program helps them stay active outdoors
- 74% feel gardening improves their mood and helps reduce stress
