Context: When there can be misrepresentations and a bias for an <u>excessive</u> # of speed bumps.


Objective: In order for affected residents to be less dependent on relying upon the integrity & protections that should be provided by Commissioner Wright & the Ward Councillor.

Resident Recommendation (Sept 26, 2023) forwarded to Road Safety by the Committee but it misrepresents community consensus

"Please build (speed bumps) on Clarkson Rd N
just the way you did on Queen St W,
so many on Queen St W
that is fantastic,
those residents who live there
absolutely love them."

???

... Resident Sept 26, 2023

NO - The majority of residents on Clarkson Rd N would not support that objective, and residents fronting on Queen St W were not consulted and consider the number excessive.

Committee members were misled, but the problem is that the Commissioner and Councillor are prepared to disregard/misrepresent a survey-vote process, and instead rely on this sort of anecdotal justification.

"Is this reflective of the consensus of the community members and ... that would be a primary concern for me that we've accounted for all your neighbours as you've mentioned before."

Subsequently determined resident had discussed with ~3 out of 50 homes on Clarkson Rd N.

Response by Clarkson Rd N Resident (20:00):

"... I walked over to <u>all of my neighbours</u> ... and every single neighbour that I've chatted with, and <u>I've chatted with about three dozen</u> at this point (*insert note: there are about <u>50 homes</u> with frontage on the street*) ... when I wanted to present this, I went around the neighborhood asking everyone and ... based on the sample that I have, I have <u>no opposition</u> to some of the thoughts I've <u>presented</u>, with the exception of ... (Facebook comments about parking on the street).

A reliable survey-vote process is important so that residents who live in the community can confirm their collective view.

The circumstances regarding the Sept 26 presentation have been addressed at greater length during Oct 4 2023 presentation to General Committee. (@ 1:39:00)

Above list suggests dozens of roadways may have been affected by misrepresentations by Commissioner Wright, and many more in future if the process is not changed.

Requesting Support from Mississauga Road Safety Committee <u>Improving Speed Bump Survey-Vote Process</u>

- motion #1 <u>availability</u> establish some criteria for when residents have a right to that survey-vote process, rather than just based on the whims of the Councillor/Commissioner.
- motion # 2 compromise option(s) establish criteria for when residents are entitled to more than just the Commissioner's max take-it-or-leave-it option, and require that residents be openly informed and involved in the development of such a compromise option ... not restricted to being a community association member. e.g. ★ Bromsgrove

motion #3 - survey-vote letters

- letters should disclose: <u>proposed #s</u> of speed bumps etc for a <u>non-binding vote</u>
- motion # 4 road signs (needed because of unreliable distribution of survey-vote letters)
 - road signs should disclose that the website identifies specific numbers of speed bumps etc for which a vote is being taken, and how to download survey-vote letters.

motion # 5 - website:

- a) state that "current projects" tab shows details for what residents are voting on
- b) * disclose distinction between 'traffic calming' and 'speed control' measures

- motion # 6 interpreting survey-voting establish guidance for interpreting results of voting when compromise option(s) included and require that Road Safety publish how they have interpreted the results (e.g. ★Commissioner misrepresenting the 2022 results for ★Bromsgrove Rd and Orr Rd and refusing to disclose intentions for 8 months).
- motion #7 <u>Disclosures to Council</u> the Commissioner should be required to disclose in his recommendations to Council how many speed bumps etc he intends to install
- motion #8 <u>Clarkson Rd N</u> request that response to Sept 26 2023 recommendation forwarded to Road Safety should be made available on request for other interested residents.
- motion #9 -★<u>accountability</u> support Oct 23, 2023 request for documentation to be available to residents regarding misrepresentations about the views of ★ Queen St W residents
- motion # 10 ★ corrective actions give consideration to what corrective actions should be taken under circumstances when Commissioner/Councillor have materially disregarded and/or misrepresented the views of affected residents, for the purpose of installing what most residents consider an excessive number of speed bumps. e.g. ★ various

motion # 11 - *gas tax 'fiefdom' agreement amongst Councillors - help to identify to the Mayor and Council that 'governance' is a problem when the Mayor and Council support formal sweetheart deals between all Councillors whereby Council abdicates its own responsibility to help support residents who are concerned about dishonesty and deception, with the Integrity Commissioners submissive to Council's wishes.

Hopefully the members of the Road Safety Committee will directly undertake to address the above considerations that are affecting communities in Mississauga, rather than simply having a motion to "receive" the presentation, or forwarding it to Commissioner Wright without specific direction. The Commissioner seems to have conflict of interest and very little incentive to address these issues.


Specific ★ roadway examples follow, in the context of the recommended motions for Road Safety Committee members.

* Park Royal Dec 2021 - 30 Speed Bumps - Councillor Karen Ras (resigned Jan 2022)

- intentions were hidden from Park Royal residents, with some association board members complicit -

Effect on survey-vote results after residents on Bromsgrove and Brookhurst discovered that information was being hidden from them.

- 3-page letters did not disclose there was an intention to install 30 speed bumps (5 roads).
- referenced webpage did not disclose role of the "current projects" tab re 30 speed bumps.
- confirmed understanding/intent by Road Safety that number of speed bumps was not the business of residents (i.e. not 'professionals'), but streets were selected by Karen Ras to spend gas tax \$ and not selected by Road Safety.



Orr Rd similar problem & March 8 2023 Gen Comm meeting confirmed communities to get re-vote.

"Some of us new folks here, only been here 16 weeks now ... but at the end of the day sometimes a government, an agency, whatever it is, needs to come in and say we need to impose ... traffic calming (insert: code talk for speed bumps)"

Conflicts with surveyed view of residents.



* Queen St W - Excessive Speed Bumps - Misrepresenting View of Residents

Queen St W residents had been unaware 12 speed bumps were going to be installed but Councillor Tedjo 'imposed' those speed bumps May 2023, along with Commissioner Wright's misrepresentations to Council of 70% support.

* Queen St W - Request for Documentation on Misrepresentations

As per the Oct 23 email to Road Safety as provided to Road Safety Committee members Nov 4:

The following documents were requested for online access by interested residents on Queen St W and adjacent streets:

- 1. The content of any notifications to residents regarding speed bumps on Queen St W, including any notifications about a survey-vote on the number of speed bumps.
- 2. Any notifications about the June 2021 webpage that identified the intended 12 speed bumps.
- 3. Details on the assertion of 70% support by residents ... including what question was asked of residents, whether or not the resident lived on Queen St W and how the survey-vote was taken if no survey-vote letters were distributed and residents were unaware of a survey-vote process.
- 4. Some explanation why Councillor Tedjo and Commissioner Wright proceeded to install the excessive speed bumps, residents with no survey-vote process regarding the number of speed bumps or the alternative of installing fewer speed bumps along with a new stop sign.
- 95% of the residents surveyed Oct 2023 believe they had a right to be informed of proposed speed bumps (with alternatives) and to express their views through a formal survey-vote process.


In the context of repeated concerns about misrepresentations, excessive speed bumps on Bromsgrove were then installed week of Nov 7 2023, immediately pursuant to Oct 23, 2023 email to Councillor Tedjo & Road Safety regarding Queen St W misrepresentations.



NO



NO - resident voting implied a <u>compromise-option</u> result of 4 speed bumps and <u>relative</u> support of 74%+. Even the support of 26% for 10 speed bumps was <u>inflated</u> by a manipulated compromise option that was established without affected residents having a voice regarding the logical location of the speed bumps.


Council Member Concerns Regarding Misrepresentations by Commissioner Wright



Councillor Dipika Damerla: March 22, 2023

"... question to Commissioner Wright ...
the surveys I think create a false narrative
with residents. This hybrid model is causing
grief because ... it gives false sense to residents
they have agency over this, and that's not
necessarily the case, and if it is, then
we should be following a much stricter way of
interpreting the results."

<u>note</u>: Because gas tax funds are used to pay for the speed bumps, the <u>Ward Councillor</u> makes the decision regarding the number of speed bumps (and whether to accept misrepresentations), and not Council, due to a reciprocal 'fiefdom' gas tax agreement for all Councillors that neuters the role of the Mayor and Council re accountability.



Commissioner Wright Deflecting Responsibility for his Misrepresentations to Council

Commissioner Wright: (March 22, 2023)

"Just to make a point of clarification, staff don't decide and get to select what traffic calming measures go in ... Council ultimately make those decisions."

NO - only the <u>Ward Councillor</u> decides whether to accept the Commissioner's misrepresentations because Council is blocked by the fiefdom gas tax agreement.



Commissioner Wright's March 22 comment above was in response to the following by Mayor Crombie:



Mayor Crombie (March 22, 2023) - "Of course, our Commissioner (and our staff) are experts in this area and they do what they think is best for the safety and security of our streets and our residents"

Road Safety already determined the compromise option. Mayor Crombie supports the misrepresentations and disregards the views of residents who live in the community.



motion # 5(b) Definition of 'Traffic calming' - resolving the obfuscations

Context: The misleading nature of the City's definition of "traffic calming" has repeatedly been used by the Commissioner and some Councillors, with the intent and effect of obfuscating communications and discrediting residents (e.g. March 8, 2023 General Committee meeting).

Clearly define the following misleading City terminology for websites, surveys, etc

- **Traffic calming measures include:**
 - a) speed bumps (i.e. 'active' or 'impact' traffic calming) and
 - b) 'passive' traffic calming such as bollards, cycle lanes and other road markings.
- Traffic calming does NOT include stop signs, speed cameras, radar displays, police enforcement, speed limits, etc
- Speed control measures include:
 - a) speed bumps and 'passive traffic' calming measures,
 - b) stop signs, speed cameras, radar displays, police enforcement, speed limits, etc

One premise of the no-option 'excessive' approach: "Do it my way ... or get nothing".

Closing Comments

It would be great if some Committee members might have some questions for which I might help clarify the above considerations, rather than no substantive expressions of interest, or only seeking responses from individuals who might seek or be compelled to misrepresent the circumstances, with no opportunity for a resident response.

It would also seem a waste of the Committee's time for some members to just use their response time to make empty political speeches about Vision Zero, and how all the team members with the City are doing such a wonderful job.

I would nevertheless note that none of the concerns herein are directed towards Manager Colin Patterson and staff in Road Safety who I think are trying to do an effective job within the constraints of their roles.

Ideally, of course, it would be good if some committee members might put forward specific motions that would undertake to address various proposals reflected in the 11 recommended motions above.
