



Engineering: Objects


Three types. The following pages present the specifications for three hedgehogs. Each object is made of %" steel plate. The resulting weight will make it impossible to move them. Furthermore, the hedgehog three leg design, in combination with the weight, will make it impossible to turn them around or fall over. If needed, we can insert sandbags in the objects interior to bring the weight up to 1000 LBS or more. The hedgehogs are provided with a hook for being able to lift them by a special vehicle. The exterior images will be powder coated with an an anti graffiti layer added.











Location: SAIB front lot & Waterfront Trail








Location: Mississauga Waterfront Trail














Production, Timing & placement

Minimum exhibition: To have a meaningful exhibition that has visual and visceral impact, we need nine Hedge Hogs. Also, this will enable us to include all soldiers from the nine provinces that Canada had in 1945.

Creative Hub's response on proposal: They look wonderful in the renderings nestled amongst the trees. Surprisingly natural despite the hard geometric lines, humble in the visual lightness created by the slivers of negative space below the structures, the handles acting as imagined points of contact the body relates to... well done design team!


Production & timing: The manufacturing of the Hedge Hogs is more time intensive than previously estimated. Right now three are in production. If we want the minimum exhibition to succeed (nine sculptures) we need to decide ordering the additional six Hedge Hogs this week.






Landscaping options

Option A: We level the ground underneath the hedgehog structure, and provide three inches of wood chips on top of geotextile. This may be helpful for maintenance (easy access to mowing) and increase safety.



Option B: We would place the hedgehog structure on the land without any landscaping. This would minimize impact on the land, be less costly and feel more authentic. This is our prefered option. Designwise, it would be much better for the hedgehogs to exist without weed protection zones so we don't scar the landscape.









Height

Uses

- Situations where both weight capacity and height are needed
- Upward and forward reach capability





Safety Engineering approval stamp

- How they rest on the ground / weight. Do they need to be supported underneath, prevent sinking too much
- Safety concerns: are they not going to moved, rolled over or pushed over
- Positioning along the path, placement advice on staying away from corners: ensure that pedestrians and cyclists do not crash into them
- Safety concerns with regard to climb-ability and falling off, any possible risks
- Maintenance of the landscape; mowing, cutting, cutting around it, any soil treatment needed
- Maintenance of the objects; vandalism; graffiti antilayer, standards, appointments w.r.t. process and capability of removing
- Not now: precise positioning of locations for 20 Hedge Hogs





Landscaping, maintenance & liability

Mowing. The maintenance team of the TRCA accesses the Arsenal lands four times a year and indicates that eventual mowing could be done by them (in case landscaping option A is chosen).

Vandalism: The TRCA will report eventual damage by vandalism (graffiti) to the project team lead (CreativeHub 1352). The project team will reserve 40K (10% of total budget) for upkeep and maintenance and will have a repair manual (following Mississauga public art management best practices) and the team will be able to deploy repairs within two weeks of notice.

Winterizing: The TRCA does not salt the asphalt pathways throughout the snow in the winter months. As a project team we find that acceptable and fitting to the nature of the project.

Liability: The project team will arrange an insurance with the insurance provider (Aon Reed Stenhouse Inc) that the City of Mississauga utilizes to manage liability for its outdoor public art works. We will provide the city of Mississauga with the policy prior to opening the exhibit to the general audience.





TRCA involvement

Agreement on the exhibition pathway. The TRCA hosted a site visit this November 15th in which members of the design team were received by five staffers from the TRCA and guided along the different pathways. The proposed map is a direct outcome of the site visit.

Forms and declarations: The TRCA allocated a project manager who requested the team to file the following: a Permission to Enter (PTE) application form and supply the following: A Copy of \$5 Million Dollars Certificate of Insurance naming "Toronto and Region Conservation Authority" 5 Shoreham Drive, Downsview as an additional insured; and a WSIB clearance certificate.


Request for engineering drawings: The TRCA requested engineering drawings and specifications, and upon reception of these documents and previous mentioned forms and declaration will issue the permit to utilize the Arsenal Lands for the planned exposition.

Timing & planning: The TRCA indicated that upon reception of the requested materials, the turnaround time for approval would be achievable within two weeks. The project team are currently in the midst of formalizing the partnership between CreativeHub and 80 Years of freedom, which is the enabling condition to file the requested paperwork.

The recent conflicts in Europe and the Middle East, along with the recognition that the last generation of World War II witnesses is fading, galvanized Jason's resolve to preserve their stories. He embarked on a mission to compile an oral and photographic history of their experiences, aiming to educate and inspire younger generations through his art.



80 Years of Freedom: Narratives



Anne Marie Holzapfel, born in Driebergen on March 29, 1940, grew up amid the harrowing backdrop of World War II with her Mother and five sisters. Her Father was taken by the Germans in 1944, leaving her Mother to raise the six daughters alone.

Anne Marie's first clear memory of freedom was running onto the main street, filled with people waving Dutch flags and Canadian tanks adorned with boys and girls.

The Canadian soldiers, who were their liberators, became a comforting presence, offering the children chocolate and visiting their home as friends. One soldier, Mr. Bachelor, even offered to adopt Anne Marie, moved by her Mother's struggle to provide adequately for her children.

The war's influence had a profound impact on Ann Marie, particularly the uncertainty surrounding her Father's fate after he was taken to the 'Oranje Hotel' prison camp and never returned. The 'Hunger Winter' combined with growing up without a Father cast a long shadow over Anne Marie's childhood and had ramifications in her adult life as well.



80 Years of Freedom: Narratives



The narratives associated with the portraits will help communicate the enduring bond between our countries, our entangled lives.

The emotional and historic elements in the stories will be instrumental in reaching the hearts and minds of a younger generation.

The portraits and stories will include Indigenous voices, as well acknowledge women's role in the enormous effort that Canada undertook.






80 Years of Freedom: City Twinning

Story
Harold Jamieson gave his life on April 2th 1945 in capturing a German defense line. His commander wrote his mother 'If I had a platoon as brave as your son, we could win this war by ourselves'. In 1950, Harold Jamieson's mother adopted Jan Lemers, a Dutch boy who had tended Harolds grave Letriers, a brutar low who had tended manulus grave in Groesbeek, to help him milgrate to Canada and to help her manage their farm that had been in the family on the reserve since 1874, as Harold would've done upon his return.

City: Brants' Ford

It originated as Brant's Ford, named for Joseph Brant, the famous Mohawk chief who was granted the site in 1784 for the settlement of the Six Nations.

Context

We believe the projects aligns well with Mississauga cultural planning, the Arsenal Lands Masterplan by the TRCA, with the character of the Small Arms Inspection building and with Canada's Indigenous legacy. The following slides present an overview.







Reframe the Arsenal Lands

The temporary public art trail may help to reframe the military history of the Arsenal Lands into a celebration of freedom that should never be taken for granted.





City of Mississauga: Cultural District

A new cultural district is planned for Lakeview by the city of Mississauga and the public art trail could become instrumental in attracting visitors from across Canada.

Lakeview has been slated for residential development, with 14,600 units planned*, as well as a new cultural district.**

The proposed public art trail leverages existing cultural assets of the Arsenal Lands and SAIB, and aims to become a new destination for visitors from across Canada.


The Tribute's celebration of freedom may resonate with Lakeview's future multicultural community and provide a sense of belonging.

Arsenal Lands: A Significant Cultural Landscape






TRCA's Trail Strategy

The Tribute project fits seamlessly with the TRCA's overall 'Trail Strategy' and as a meaningful way to protect the cultural heritage of the Arsenal Lands.

We hope to work with your current plans for this space as our project is adaptable and our main focus is low impact on the environment.

A Tribute to Canada is an opportunity for the TRCA to provide cultural programming that connects the community with green space, leading to the appreciation of nature spaces within the broader urban landscape.





Indigenous Legacy

Indigenous people from every region of Canada served in the armed forces during the Second World War, fighting in every major battle and campaign of the conflict.*

We are consulting with the history specialist of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation, to curate 2 portraits of Indigenous soldiers for the trail.

The Royal Canadian Legion Liberation of the Netherlands Branch 005 and the Aboriginal Veterans created the Indigenous Legacy Project. This research and remembrance-based initiative aimed to mark grave sites for indigenous soldiers buried across the Netherlands. We plan to include some portraits of indigenous soldiers from the initiative in the public art trail.
